## **Budget Season**

Some of us might call this time of year, “Basketball Season,” or “Tax Season,” but for us here at BHCS, it is also “Budget Season.” The process of working on the budget for the 2017-2018 school year actually began in November of 2016 and won’t officially end until our Town Meeting on April 8, 2017. It began when teachers and support staff all provided information about what money they will need the following school year for books, field trips, furniture, subscriptions, equipment, professional development, repairs, and so on. From that information I came up with changes in costs from last year’s budget and met with the superintendent and business manager to get those changes entered into the budget. Meanwhile, our special education director came up with costs for the Special Education portion of the budget and we gathered information about what our high school costs would be. We had our first draft to the school board on January 11 and have been meeting weekly to comb through the budget ever since.

There are many parts to our approximately \$5.5 million budget. Some parts of the budget are fixed costs and we are unable to trim back, most notably Special Education (set by state/federal mandate) and Secondary Education (set by local high schools)—both large parts of our budget that have seen steady increases year over year. The costs of Regular Instruction and Operations and Maintenance are both areas that our school board looks through, clarifies, and trims. With steady increases in fixed costs, and the school board’s goal to present a budget increase to the town in the 2-3% range, other non-fixed areas are what have to be cut. Our Regular Instruction line that includes teacher salaries and benefits, classroom supplies, furniture, instructional equipment, and field trips has been trimmed down significantly and is less than last year’s budgeted amount, despite an anticipated increase in enrollment. In order to present a low-increase budget to the town, we have to compensate for the increased fixed costs by cutting what we can.
